

Children's Speech and Language Therapy Wiggly woo game

Wiggly woo is a game to help children learn rhyme. Rhyme is important for sound awareness and helps with reading. Here's how to play.

Wiggly woo with a clue

- Cut out the pictures.
- You can play a posting game. You could play by asking your child to put counters on the picture that rhymes.
- Say the sentence to your child but not the last word. For example, 'wiggly wiggly wus, I go on the ..?'
- Encourage your child to say or find the word that rhymes and find the picture.
- If they get stuck, offer a choice. For example 'is it bus, or flag?'
- Model the word if they don't know.

When your child is very good at finding these rhyme words with a clue, try them without a clue.

Wiggly woo without a clue

- Cut out the pictures
- You can play a posting game. You could play by asking your child to put counters on the picture that rhymes.
- Say the sentence to your child. Do not name the rhyming the word. This time the sentence does not give a clue. For example 'wiggly wiggly wabbit. I can see a...?'
- Encourage your child to say the word that rhymes and find the picture
- If they get stuck, offer a choice. For example 'is it fish or rabbit?'
- You can model the word if they don't know.

Keep practicing until your child can find the rhyme words on their own.

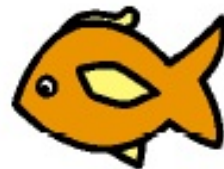
